

# ANTHROPOLOGY COURSES FOR FALL 2011

## **ANTH 10000 INTRODUCTION TO ANTHROPOLOGY**

MW 4:30-5:20 LILY 1105 Blanton  
A general introduction to anthropology's holistic approach to human nature and behavior. A basic survey of biocultural development and evolutionary process, and of human uniformity and diversity through time and across space. (CRN - 11021)

## **ANTH 20100 INTRODUCTION TO ARCHAEOLOGY AND WORLD PREHISTORY**

TTh 12:00-1:15 FRNY G140 Lindsay  
Introduction to the ideas and practices of archaeology that are used in the study of human prehistory, from the earliest stone tools to the development of agriculture and states. Emphasis is placed on the objectives and methods of contemporary archaeology. (CRN -11042)

## **ANTH 20300 BIOLOGICAL BASES OF HUMAN SOCIAL BEHAVIOR**

MW 4:30-5:45 STON 215 Carlson  
This course is an introduction to human social behavior from the perspective of biological anthropology, with special emphasis on human evolution and non-human primates. Topics include aggression, communication, learning, maturation, sexuality, and the evolution of social systems. (CRN-53271)

## **ANTH 20400 INTRODUCTION TO BIOLOGICAL ANTHROPOLOGY AND HUMAN EVOLUTION**

MW 2:30-3:20 PHYS 223 Carlson  
This course surveys biological anthropology through a review of evolutionary theory and genetics, the fossil evidence for current theories in human evolution with insight from modern non-human primates, and the influence of environmental stressors on modern human biological variation. (CRN-11043)

## **ANTH 20500 HUMAN CULTURAL DIVERSITY**

Using concepts and models of cultural anthropology, this course will survey the principal cultural types of the world and their distribution, and will undertake a detailed analysis of society's representative of each type.

## **ANTH 21000 TECHNOLOGY AND CULTURE**

TTh 3:00-4:15 UNIV 203 Lindsay  
This course explores the social dimensions of technology from the perspective of ancient, modern, and post-modern society. Topics include the origins of particular technologies; processes of technical development and dissemination; the politics of everyday artifacts; virtual identities; and technologies of the body. (CRN -45802)

## **ANTH 21200 CULTURE, FOOD AND HEALTH**

TTh 4:30-5:45 GRIS 166 Williams  
This course is designed to provide an introduction to the field of Medical Anthropology in which we will examine issues related to health and illness from various perspectives outside of the Western biomedical perspective. (CRN - 11053)

## **ANTH 23000 GENDER ACROSS CULTURES**

TTh 10:30-11:45 KRAN G016 Blackwood  
TTh 1:30-2:45 UNIV 203 Blackwood  
Explores gender and sexuality from a cross-cultural perspective. Draws on case studies to explore the complexities of women's and men's lives. Examines gender hierarchies, gender in a globalized world, and the cultural construction of sexuality and gender. (CRN -36893)

## **ANTH 31300 THE ARCHAEOLOGY OF NORTH AMERICA**

MWF 8:30-9:20 LILY 3118 Cooper  
Archaeological overview of North America emphasizing Indigenous cultures prior to the arrival of Europeans, but including Contact and Post-Contact communities of the Historic Period. Topics will include the peopling of the Americas, culture and environment, social complexity, and Cultural Resource Management. (CRN-50928)

## **ANTH 33500 PRIMATE BEHAVIOR**

TTh 10:30-11:45 STON 217 Remis  
This course is an introduction to the primate order and primate studies. The emphasis is on field studies. Ecological influences on social organization and behavior, learning, play, and communication will be considered as adaptations within an evolutionary framework. (CRN-36904)

## **ANTH 33600 HUMAN VARIATION**

TTh 9:00-10:15 BRNG B268 Buzon  
Biological differences between human individuals and groups, causes of variations, the role of genetics, concepts of race, and the interrelationship between the social and biological meanings of race will be considered. (CRN-51254)

## **ANTH 34000 GLOBAL PERSPECTIVES ON HEALTH**

TTh 3:00-4:15 STON 217 Gruenbaum  
This course examines health issues and risks faced by individuals around the world, but especially in resource poor geographical areas. We will explore in-depth the gendered, ethnic, cultural, and class dimensions that underlie the patterning of disease and illness worldwide. (CRN-51292)

## **ANTH 34100 CULTURE AND PERSONALITY**

MWF 12:30-1:20 LYNN 1136 Christodoulakis  
A cross-cultural survey stressing different basic personality types and the processes by which adult personality is acquired. Case studies of selected non-Western cultures will be used to provide comparative perspective. (CRN 11055)

## **ANTH 35200 DRUGS, CULTURE, AND SOCIETY**

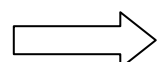
The course provides an overview of the social and cultural underpinnings of drug use across societies. Students engage with various topics, including addiction, global markets, drug epidemics, public policy, and cross-cultural differences in drug use.

## **ANTH 37900 NATIVE AMERICAN CULTURES**

MWF 12:30-1:20 SMTH 108 Cooper  
General survey of North American Indian cultures. Topics to be covered include prehistory; languages; economic, social, and political organization; religion, aesthetics; culture contact and change; and contemporary Native American issues. (CRN-50866)

# ANTHROPOLOGY COURSES FOR FALL 2011

## **ANTH 39200 CULT SHAPING VIOLENCE**

TTh 12:00-1:15 STON 215 Anderson  
Inspects culture-specific as well as more universal aspects of violence, and its absence, as these are enabled, managed, curtailed, and rationalized within socioculture, around the world and throughout history. Topics range from the domestic sphere to institutionalized violence in war and global terrorism.

## **ANTH 39200 ANTHROPOLOGY AND BLACKNESS**

MW 4:30-5:45 UNIV 203 Abdul- Khabeer  
Anthropology and Blackness: This course is a critical examination of the interrelated histories of anthropology, the concept of blackness, and the experiences of Afro-diasporic peoples. (CRN-51308)

## **ANTH 41000 ETHNICITY AND CULTURE**

MWF 12:30-1:20 STON 217 O'Brien  
This course examines ethnicity and nation as social constructs that vary across cultures, history and space, and surveys major theories of culture, ethnicity and nationalism. Issues examined include cultural identities, power, domination and resistance, and the increasing role of identity politics in contemporary conflicts.

## **ANTH 50700 THEORY IN SOCIOCULTURAL ANTHROPOLOGY**

W 8:30-11:20 UNIV 203 Zanotti  
The course uses a broad cross-cultural comparative perspective to identify and analyze the major forms of human social organization. Emphasis is on kinship terminology, descent, marriage, residence units, economic exchange, political structure, and social inequality. (CRN-51276)

## **ANTH 51400 ANTHROPOLOGICAL LINGUISTICS**

TTh 3:00-4:15 STON 215 Anderson  
Investigates the varieties of communication in human behavior and explores linguistics as a tool in social science research. Areas covered include structural linguistics, historical, and comparative linguistics. Sociolinguistic literature, nonverbal communication, origins of human language and speech, and other semiotic and extra-communication functions of language will be discussed. Attention is also given to anthropological applications of methodological techniques and theoretical models from linguistics.

## **ANTH 53400 HUMAN OSTEOLOGY**

TTh 1:30-2:45 STON 217 Buzon  
Anatomy of the human skeleton and dentition. Detailed study of skeletal elements and teeth, morphology, function, disease, and pathology. Identification of human remains with regard to age at death, gender, growth, and development in biocultural context. (CRN-45806)

## **ANTH 53500 FOUNDATIONS OF BIOLOGICAL ANTHROPOLOGY**

TTh 12:00-1:15 STON 217 Williams  
This course covers such topics important in Biological anthropology as applied to both living and extinct humans and primates. Possible topics include: evolutionary thought; genetics, race, and human variation; the intersection of biology and culture; fossils and paleoanthropology; ecology and speciation; primate behavior; and theories on the social behavior of early humans. (CRN-11071)

## **ANTH 57500 ECONOMIC ANTHROPOLOGY**

TTh 4:30-5:45 STON 215 Blanton  
Investigates economic aspects of nonindustrial societies, including forager, tribal, and peasant social formations. Emphasis on the economics of the domestic sphere and how households are linked to larger structures such as market systems and "world systems." (CRN-51262)

## **ANTH 59200 WORKING ACROSS CULTURES**

MWF 12:30-1:20 STON 215 Nolan  
This course will focus on how well-trained professional from a variety of disciplines learn to apply what they know in cross-cultural situations. We'll look at the nature of cross-cultural learning and adjustment, how we communicate across cultures, how we work with other professionals, and how we can carry these application skills with us from one culture to another. The course is designed for students from a variety of disciplines and backgrounds. (CRN- 36889)
