

PROPOSED CURRICULUM CHANGES

#11-1

The following curriculum changes were approved by the Liberal Arts Curriculum Committee at their meeting on **Wednesday, September 7, 2011**.

New & Revised Courses

- ANTH 23500** **The Great Apes.** New course. Sem.1 & 2. Cr. 3. Students will learn about the behavior and conservation of our closest relatives and how early ape studies changed our understanding of what it meant to be human. Topics include gender in science, ethics of research and cross-cultural understandings. No prerequisites.
- ANTH 33700** **Human diet: Origins and evolution.** New course. Sem. 1 & 2. Cr. 3. This course will survey humans evolving relationship with food over the last few million years: from our Plio-pleistocene origins (foraging) through the origins of agriculture to modern industrial food production. No prerequisites required.
- GS 30000** **CLA Influentials.** Change course attribute to “may be repeated for a maximum of 4 credits.”
- HIST 25000** **US Relations with the Middle East and North Africa.** New course. Sem. 1 & 2. Cr. 3. This course examines US relations with the Middle East and North Africa since World War II. No prerequisites.
- HIST 39500** **Junior Research Seminar.** Course revision. Change course description and requisites as follows: This is a variable topic seminar for history majors in their junior year intended to teach historical skills, including research in primary sources, analytical skills, and forming historical arguments. This is a writing intensive course and counts as one of the major requirements. **Restrictions:** History majors only; may not be enrolled as the following classifications: freshman (0-29 hours).
- HIST 48800** **History of Sexual Regulation in the United States.** New course. Sem. 1 & 2. Cr. 3. This course will illuminate broad theses in the historical regulation of sexual violence, consensual sex, and homosexuality. Students will understand and analyze how cultural, social, religious, and moral ideologies have influenced conceptions of deviant and normative sexuality in the United States. No prerequisites.
- THTR 29000** **Special Topics in Theatre.** Course revision. Move course from Calumet campus to West Lafayette campus. Course description: Topics will vary. No prerequisite is required. Theatre majors and minors will have priority. May be repeated for a maximum of four credits.
