Description

This course thematically explores the history of Native American women in North America. The course is grounded in the particular theoretical and methodological concerns of Indigenous history and the intersection of Indigenous, feminist and post-colonial studies. Topics will include colonization and decolonization, identity, sovereignty, activism, leadership, kinship, stereotypes and public images. This course is conducted as a seminar which means that each meeting will center on discussion of the assigned materials. It is essential that students come to class prepared to discuss the readings, pose questions, and share their thoughts on the assigned material. It is not a lecture driven course.

Course Objectives

- Students will demonstrate knowledge of the main topics in the political, social, cultural, spiritual, and economic history of Native American women
- Students will exhibit analytical skills sufficient to distinguish between primary and secondary sources, to analyze arguments and interpretations, and to recognize interpretive conflicts through reviews and essays
- Students will validate their research skills sufficient to conduct an investigation, consulting appropriate works through developing a research proposal, bibliography, and essay
- Students will prove their ability to interpret evidence found in primary sources and develop historical arguments based on and sustained by the evidence available
- Students will demonstrate writing skills sufficient to produce historical essays that are coherent, cogent, and grammatically correct

Required Texts

Readings will be assigned as pdfs available through BB or direct email attachment from professor.

Assessment

- Book Reviews (2) 800 words each
- Research Essay (proposal and preliminary bibliography, outline and annotated bibliography, PPT and presentation) 5000 words/20 pages
- Precis and discussion questions (10) 1 page
