
BLACK WATER SISTER BYZEN CHO




TAO TE CHING BY LAO TZU

Lao Tsu's philosophy is simple: Accept what is in front of you without wanting the situation to be other than it is. Study the natural order of things and work with it rather than against it, for to try to change what is only sets up resistance. Nature provides everything without requiring payment or thanks. It does so without discrimination. So let us present the same face to everyone and treat them all as equals, however they may behave. If we watch carefully, we will see that work proceeds more quickly and easily if we stop "trying," if we stop putting in so much extra effort, if we stop looking for results. In the clarity of a still and open mind, truth will be reflected. Te—which may be translated as "virtue" or "strength"—lies always in Tao meaning "the way" or "natural law." In other words: Simply be.

WHEN THE SEA TURNED TO SILVER BY GRACELIN




UNDER HEAVEN BY GUY GAVRIEL KAY



Growing up on the moon, Xingyin is unaware that she is being hidden from the Celestial Emperor who exiled her mother for stealing his elixir of immortality. But when Xingyin's existence is discovered, she must leave her home and her mother behind. She makes her way to the Celestial Kingdom, a land of wonder and secrets. Disguising her identity, she learns alongside the emperor's son, mastering archery and magic, even as passion flames between her and the prince. To save her mother, Xingyin confronts legendary creatures and vicious enemies. But when forbidden magic threatens the kingdom, she must challenge the ruthless Celestial Emperor—striking a dangerous bargain in which she is torn between losing all she loves or plunging the realm into chaos.






SHE WHO BECAME THE SUN BY SHELLEY PARKER-CHAN

In 1345, China lies under harsh Mongol rule. For the peasants of the Central Plains, greatness is something found only in stories. When the Zhu family's son, Zhu Chongba, is given a fate of greatness, everyone is mystified, while the fate of nothingness received by the family's clever daughter is only as expected. But when bandits orphan the two children, it is Zhu who succumbs to despair and dies. Desperate to escape her own fated death, the girl uses her brother's identity to enter a monastery. Propelled by her desire to survive, Zhu learns she is capable of doing whatever it takes to stay hidden from her fate. After her sanctuary is destroyed for supporting the rebellion against Mongol rule, Zhu takes the chance to claim another future altogether: her brother's abandoned greatness.


SIDDHARTHABY HERMANN HESSE

Though set in a place and time far removed from the Germany of 1922, the year of the book's debut, Siddhartha infuses the sensibilities of Hesse's time, synthesizing disparate philosophies—Eastern religions, Jungian archetypes, Western individualism-into a unique vision of life expressed through one man's search for meaning. It is the story of Siddhartha, a wealthy Indian Brahmin who casts off a life of privilege and comfort to seek spiritual fulfillment. On his journey, Siddhartha encounters wandering ascetics, Buddhist monks, and successful merchants, as well as a courtesan named Kamala and a simple ferryman who has attained enlightenment. Traveling among these people and experiencing life's vital passages—love, work, friendship, and fatherhood—Siddhartha discovers true knowledge is quided from within.



CHINA'S GOLDEN AGE: EVERYDAY LIFE IN THE TANG DYNASTY BY CHARLES BENN

Alongside Benn's own illustrations, this rich account examines the history of the Tang dynasty as well as its complex societal structures. Explore all aspects of day-to-day life in ancient China: Attend an ancient feast to celebrate an imperial birthday; learn which colors concubines used for their eye makeup and beauty marks and what jealous wives did to discourage such enhancement; see the similarities between today's pubs and the Tang alehouses; and decide for yourself why Yangzhou, a city on the Grand Canal close to the Yangtze River, was considered one of the greatest cities in the Tang Dynasty. Benn translates and paraphrases his classical Chinese sources from the Tang era with fresh and polished prose.



THE OPIUM WAR: DRUGS, DREAMS, AND THE MAKING OF MODERN CHINA BY JULIA LOVELL

In October 1839, a Windsor cabinet meeting voted to begin the first Opium War against China. Bureaucratic fumbling, military missteps, and a healthy dose of political opportunism and collaboration followed. Rich in tragicomedy, *The Opium War* explores the disastrous British foreign-relations move that became a founding myth of modern Chinese nationalism, and depicts China's heroic struggle against Western conspiracy. Lovell examines the causes and consequences of the Opium War, interweaving tales of the opium pushers and dissidents. More importantly, she analyses how the Opium Wars shaped China's self-image and created an enduring model for its interactions with the West, plagued by





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
