









The Frangipani Tree Mystery by Ovidia Yu is set in


1936 in the Crown Colony of Singapore where the British
abdication crisis and rising Japanese threat seem far away.

When the nanny looking after the Acting Governor's daughter
dies suddenly, Mission-School-educated local girl Su Lin—an
aspiring journalist trying to escape an arranged marriage—
takes her place. But then another murder at the residence
occurs, and it takes all of Su Lin's skills and intelligence to
help British Chief Inspector Thomas LeFroy solve the murders
—and escape with her own life.



The Murder at the Vicarage by Agatha Christie is one of the author's most popular books and the first to introduce Miss Marple. Miss Marple encounters a compelling murder mystery in St. Mary Mead, where under the seemingly peaceful exterior of an English country village lurks intrigue, guilt, deception, and death. Colonel Protheroe, local magistrate and overbearing landowner is the most detested man in the village. Everyone, even the vicar, wishes he were dead, and suspicions run amok when Protheroe is found dead at the vicarage. Faced with a surfeit of suspects, only the inscrutable Miss Marple can unravel the tangled web of clues that will lead to the unmasking of the killer.

When Lila Macapagal returns home after a painful breakup, she is tasked with saving her Tita Rosie's failing restaurant and tolerating matchmaking aunties. wealth and social hierarchy, Rachel navigates the


complexities of high society alongside Nicholas' formidable

Asians offers a captivating glimpse into the clash of old and


new money, Overseas Chinese versus Mainland Chinese, and

means to be young, in love, and gloriously rich.










Sugarbread by Balli Kaur Jaswal

Then her meddlesome grandmother moves in, installing a portrait of a watchful Sikh guru and a new set of house rules. Old secrets begin to surface, but can Pin handle learning the truth?







The Great Reclamation by Rachel Heng

Ah Boon grows up in a 20th-century fishing village in coastal Singapore under British rule's waning influence. He is uninterested in fishing and, instead, prefers the company of neighbor Siok Mei. Discovering a talent for finding hidden islands, Ah Boon gains new purpose impressing Siok Mei and aiding his community. A powerful coming-of-age story that reckons with the legacy of British colonialism, the World War II Japanese occupation, and the pursuit of modernity, *The Great Reclamation* confronts the wounds of progress, the sacrifices of love, and the difficulty of defining home when nature and nation collide.



Ministry of Moral Panic by Amanda Lee Koe

Meet an over-the-hill Pop Yé-yé singer with a faulty heart, two conservative middle-aged women holding hands in the Galápagos, and the proprietor of a laundromat with a penchant for sad Cantonese songs, among others. By turns heartfelt and sexy, Koe's stories encompass a skewed world fraught with prestige anxiety, moral relativism, sexual frankness, and the improbable necessity of human connection. This collection explores the complex task of understanding Singapore and its citizens in the twenty-first century.



A Book of Hims by Ng Yi-Sheng

A Book of Hims is a spiritual sequel to Yi-Sheng's debut collection Last Boy (2008), winner of the Singapore Literature Prize. Although Yi-Sheng's voice has matured, his work remains just as eccentric and reckless as before. Revisiting topics such as love and spirituality and recollecting current and past romances, Yi-Sheng composes odes to mentors and holy figures and experiments with diverse poetic forms, including the haiku, the sonnet, the ghazal, and the jueju. Heartfelt, surreal, and evocative, these poems are a splendid addition to the growing body of Singapore literature.



Alfian Sa'at Malay Sketches



(Singapore's indigenous people) that borrows its name from a book of anecdotes by British colonial governor Frank


