### MANUSCRIPT IN PROGRESS

"Jurisdictional Conflict, Legal Localism, and Military Vice Regulation in Occupied Nashville, 1860-1868"

Local and national jurisdictional configurations were central to establishing legitimate authority in Civil War era Union Army occupied Nashville, Tennessee. Local authorities disputed federal military and constitutional pre-emption doctrines as unfree persons, Black and white, sought novel judicial remedies and pursued their own prosecutions Legal claims adjudicated in these fleeting jurisdictional configurations transformed wartime conceptualizations of legal personhood, vice regulation and public health, and prefigured postwar citizenship claims.
