Overview:

The two world wars fought in the twentieth century shaped and defined today's world. No other events were as important. This course is an in-depth look at the second of those wars, from its origins to its conclusion and legacy. But it is also about how historians, journalists, novelists, filmmakers, and readers have tried to make sense out of the war and give meaning to it. It is important to recognize that the meaning of the war has changed in the last sixty-five years, and that Americans during the hottest moments of the Cold War and the dog-days of the Vietnam War saw World War II in radically different lights. To understand this is to comprehend why the past is never dead and why history is important.
