

SPRING 2021 CLCS COURSES

CLCS 231 Survey of Latin Literature — D. Conner

Survey of Latin literature during the late Republic and early Empire. Authors include Vergil, Ovid, Cicero, Livy, and Lucretius. All readings in English.

CLCS 233.01 Comparative Mythology—C. Campbell

Comparative study of the myths of major ancient cultures, with emphasis on shared typological features. All readings in English.

CLCS 233.02 Comparative Mythology Asynchronous — K. Dickson

Comparative study of the myths of major ancient cultures, with emphasis on shared typological features. All readings in English.

CLCS 237 Gender & Sexuality in Greek & Roman Antiquity — D. Conner

How identities based on gender, sexual behavior and sexual desire, and socio-economic status are established in ancient Greece and Rome. Exploration of why these ancient views of gender and sexuality remain of continuing importance in the 21st century. All readings in English.

CLCS 337 The Ancient Epic — K. Dickson

Study of the epic in four ancient cultures, with emphasis on its structure, nature, and social functions. Readings include *Gilgamesh*, *Iliad*, *Aeneid*, and *Beowulf*. All readings in English.

CLCS 380 Alexander the Great (2 sections) — N. Rauh

Course examines the career of Alexander the Great and the rise of Macedonia in the Hellenistic Era. Topics include the emergence of Macedonia under Philip II; the achievements of Alexander the Great; and the wars of succession following his demise.

GREK 102 Greek Level II — E. Mercier

Continuation of the study of Attic Greek grammar and reading of connected prose of the Classical period. This course has an honors option.

GREK 202 Greek Level IV — E. Mercier

Upper intermediate reading course in ancient Greek, designed to consolidate students' knowledge of grammar and syntax, broaden vocabulary, and develop precision and confidence in reading and translation.

LATN 102 Latin Level II (2 sections) — C. Campbell & E. Mercier

Second semester introduction to Latin. Focus on grammar, syntax, vocabulary, and elementary readings in classical Latin and the language of the Vulgate. This course has an honors option.

LATN 202 Latin Level IV — E. Moodie

Upper intermediate reading course, designed to consolidate students' grasp of grammar and syntax, broaden vocabulary, and develop precision and confidence in reading and translation. In Spring 2021 we will read selections from Horace's *Sermones* and Juvenal's *Saturae*. This course has an honors option.

LATN 443 Roman Satire — E. Moodie

Upper-level reading course, designed to develop advanced Latin reading skills and explore the social, political, and rhetorical issues raised by satirical texts from ancient Rome. In Spring 2021 we will read selections from Horace's *Sermones* and Juvenal's *Saturae*. This course has an honors option.
