The MFA program defines successful placement in terms of quality of publications rather than academic positions, and the program trains its graduates to place their work in highly-regarded venues. MFA students and alumni are published novelists, short story writers, essayists, and poets. They are Wallace Stegner Fellows, Yaddo and Bread Loaf residents, Pushcart Prize and O'Henry Prize winners. Our students and alumni have had their stories, poetry, and essays published in prestigious journals and papers such as *The Atlantic Monthly, Ploughshares, Prairie Schooner, Tin House, Boston Review, The Rumpus, The Believer, Glimmer Train, Virginia Quarterly Review* and frequently have their work published in *Best American Poetry* (Simon & Schuster) and *Best New Poets* (University of Virginia Press). Since the program expects graduates to spend several years developing their work, any current assessment of placement must necessarily include additional information on publications of students going back to at least 2010. A partial list of such publications is included below.

Gregory R. Allendorf_(MFA, 2013) Gregory is currently a PhD candidate at University of Missouri-Columbia with a concentration in poetry. His chapbook, *Fair Day in an Ancient Town*, was selected by Kiki Petrosino for the Mineral Point Chapbook series from Brain Mill Press (official release February 2016) and his poems have been published in *Chicago Quarterly Review*, *Gigantic Sequins*, and *Memorious: A Journal of New Verse and Fiction*. Lindsey Alexander (MFA, 2014) Lindsey Alexander's poems and essays have appeared in the journals and anthologies *Hayden's Ferry Review*, *Third Coast, Colorado Review*, *Crazyhorse, Cream City Review*, *Green Mountain Review*, *New Poetry from the Midwest*, and *How to Live: Advice from Poets*, edited by Rita Mae Reese.

Winner of the 2012 "Discovery" / *Boston Review* Poetry Prize, he currently teaches English at The Westminster Schools in Atlanta, Georgia.

Kelsey Ann Cox (MFA, 2011) Kelsey's short fiction has appeared in *Tales of the Unanticipated*, *REAL: Regarding Arts and Letters* and *Albion Review*. Kelsey currently teaches English at Southern New Hampshire University.

Jessica Jacobs (MFA, 2013) Jessica Jacobs is the author of <u>Pelvis with Distance</u> (White Pine Press, April 2015), winner of the 2015 New Mexico Book Award in Poetry and an Over the Rainbow selection by the American Library Association. Her poetry, essays, and fiction have appeared widely in publications including Beloit Poetry Journal, The Missouri Review, Rattle, The Oxford American, and the Academy of American Poets' Poem-a-Day series. Jessica now serves as faculty at Writing Workshops in Greece and as the 2016 Hendrix-Murphy Writer-in-Residence at Hendrix College in Conway, AR.

Alisha Karabinus's (MFA, 2014, PhD candidate, English) short fiction has been published in many journals including *PANK*, *The Pinch*, *Baltimore Review*, *The Southeast Review*, *Word Riot*, *Ninth Letter*, *and Smokelong Quarterly* and has been shortlisted or a finalist for many awards including Flyway's Iowa Sweet Corn Prize for Short Fiction and the Glimmer Train Very Short Fiction Contest 2014. Rebecca McKanna (MFA, 2015) Rebecca's short fiction, creative non-fiction, and poetry have appeared in <u>Midwestern Gothic, Narrative's</u> Story of the Week, <u>Michigan Quarterly Review</u>, and <u>Arts & Letters</u>, among other publications. In 2014 Rebecca was one of Narrative Magazine's "Thirty Under Thirty" List and she has been a finalist for numerous awards including Arts & Letters' 2014 PRIME Poetry Prize. Starting in August, she will serve as a visiting assistant professor of English and creative writing at Waldorf College.

Beth McDermott_(MFA, 2014) Beth McDermott is the author of How to Leave a Farmhouse, a chapbook published by Porkbelly Press (2015). She earned her PhD from the Program for Writers at the University of Illinois at Chicago. Beth's poetry has been published in journals such as DIAGRAM, Harpur Palate, Bayou, Watershed Review, The National Poetry Review, and Southern Humanities Review. She is an associate editor with RHINO.

Rosalie Ruth Moffett_(MFA, 2013) Rosalie is currently a Wallace Stegner Fellow in the department of Creative Writing at Stanford University. Her poems have appeared in Tin House, The Believer, FIELD, Prairie Schooner, Hayden's Ferry Review, Cincinnati Review, AGNI, Ploughshares, Indiana Review and other magazines, as well as the anthology Gathered: Contemporary Quaker Poets.

Emily Skaja's (MFA, 2015) poems have been published by or are forthcoming from such prestigious journals and anthologies as Best New Poets 2015, Blackbird, Black Warrior Review, Devil's Lake, Gulf Coast, Indiana Review, Mid-American Review, Ninth Letter, PANK, The Pinch, Pleiades, Southern Indiana Review, and Vinyl.
