### *Current Research Interests*

My general research agenda involves the study of Germany in a European and international

context. I am eager not only to offer original monographic contributions, but to help to shape the wider professional debate about what constitutes “international history.” Archival research on my second book project is complete. I have drafted eight chapters of the book thus far (out of an anticipated twelve), along with preparing several related conference papers. As discussed at length with a representative from Cambridge University Press, the working title is “Trading Power: West Germany’s Rise to Global Influence from Adenauer to Schmidt.” It explores West German efforts to find a suitable international role at a time when economic power appeared to eclipse raw military might as the key to influence in world affairs.

As one spin-off from that project, I am revising a conference paper on German military exports (from the GSA in Oakland, 2010) for submission to the *Vierteljahrshefte für Zeitgeschichte*, the most prestigious German-language journal on contemporary political history.

Research funding opportunities in the summer of 2012 led me back into the archives to explore plans for a third book project. This will allow me to deepen my exploration of the “Global South” and the world economy – one facet of my long-term plan to emerge a leading voice on global history since 1945. The new project runs under the title “No Other World Was Possible: West Germany and the Global South in the Radical Seventies.” It will feature case studies on Chile, South Africa, Iran, and Nicaragua, using West Germany as a focal lens in evaluating the seeming promise (or menace) of utopian socialist agendas in the world economy. Research from summer 2012 in Berlin and Amsterdam will be supplemented down the road by work in Washington, London, and doubtless many other locations. Near-term goals for this project include an article on the German contribution to Iran’s nuclear program: “Building Bushehr.”
