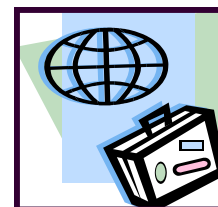

“The Americanization of French Society”

The Department of History welcomes Jean-Pierre Dormois professor of history at Université Marc Bloch in Strasbourg. Dr. Dormois will speak on “The Americanization of French Society.” He has held a Fulbright scholarship and Adams, Bourse Lavoisier, and Knox fellowships. His recent books include: *Classical Trade Protectionism* (Routledge 2006) with Pedro Lains and *The French Economy in the 20th Century* (CUP 2004). He also has published more than thirty scholarly articles. Dr. Dormois also serves as the Director of a research project “The Dynamics of Social Inequality in Europe and Asia, 19th-20th Century” (in association with the Rural Economics Institute (IER) at Hitotsubashi University in Tokyo).

Dr. Dormois earned an M.A. in Economics at Harvard University and a Ph.D. in History at the European University Institute in Florence.

Thirty-nine of the 55 Delegates to the Constitutional Convention signed the United States Constitution on September 17, 1787. The Congress, by joint resolution, has designated September 17th as "Citizenship Day" and the week beginning September 17th and ending September 23rd of each year as "Constitution Week". Public Law 108-477 contained in the recent Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2005 states that "each educational institution that receives Federal funds for a fiscal year shall hold an educational program on the United States Constitution on September 17 of such year for the students served by the educational institution."

MUNICH AND GREECE SPRING BREAK 2007



The Purdue History Department and the Study Abroad office will repeat a program for spring break 2007 which integrates an international experience with either of two standard Purdue courses. HIST 102I and HIST 104I will each meet regularly on campus on Wednesdays and Fridays throughout Spring Semester. Over spring break, however, the two classes will travel together to Munich and Greece to experience in person many of the things that we are studying. While abroad, both classes will follow the same itinerary and visit the same sites, but see them from different perspectives. For example, when we visit the Residenz palace in Munich, the 102I students will see and analyze a collection of ancient sculpture in the Antiquarium Hall, while the 104I students will see the same thing as evidence of Renaissance culture.

Classes are limited to 15 students each. Each class may be taken for Honors if requested. Independent Study credit (HIST 590M) can also be arranged for students who have already taken 102 or 104. Estimated cost (in addition to normal semester fees) is about \$2000, including air fare, hotels, admissions, local transportation, and most meals.

Instructors: Gordon D. Young for 102I and Gordon R. Mork for 104I. Both are very experienced leaders of international travel and study programs at Purdue. With the permission of the instructor, advanced students can participate by taking HIST 590M.

PLANNED INTINERARY

Friday, March 9: Bus departs West Lafayette at 10:30 a.m. from in front of University Hall. Depart Chicago for Munich via Lufthansa Airlines (meals en route).

Saturday, March 10: Arrive in Munich in the morning. Public transportation to Euro Youth Hotel. Walking tour of Old Munich including the Frauenkirche (Munich's famous Gothic Cathedral), the Marienplatz (Munich's cultural center), the gates of the old City Walls, and the Viktualenmarkt (the city's traditional food market). Welcome dinner in Ratskellar (city hall) provided in the evening.

Sunday, March 11: Museum Day: the Glyptothek (museum of ancient statuary), the Antikensammlung (various antiquities including a spectacular exhibit of ancient Athenian Red and Black Figure ware – the pottery that made Athens famous – and rich!), and both the Alte and Neue Pinakotheks (the old and new art galleries). Free time. Classical music performance in an historic venue.

Monday, March 12: Visit the Residenz Palace and its spectacular Antiquarium and then walk Hitler's Munich. Free time. Concluding banquet in Hofbräuhaus provided in the evening.

Tuesday, March 13: Morning in Deutsches Museum followed by a visit to the Dachau concentration camp and Schleissheim Palace. Evening flight to Athens.

Wednesday, March 14: Morning walking tour of Acropolis and Agora. Welcome luncheon in Monastiraki neighborhood provided. Free time for shopping, visiting optional sites.

Thursday, March 15: National Archaeological Museum in the morning. Afternoon: charter coach to Old Corinth and Mycenae. Evening in Tolo.

Friday, March 16: Coach trip to Delphi via Lepanto (site of the Spanish victory over the Ottomans in 1571). Evening in Delphi.

Saturday, March 17: Delphi site and museum in the morning. Return to Athens via Dhistomon (the site of a Nazi massacre of Greeks in World War II) and the Byzantine monastery of Hosios Loukas. Concluding banquet provided.

Sunday, March 18: Fly Lufthansa Airlines Athens to Munich. Connect with flight to Chicago, arriving in afternoon. Coach to West Lafayette, arrive circa 7 pm.

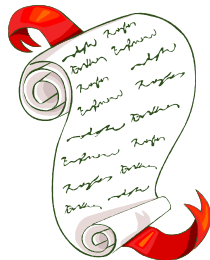

Appointments are made on a competitive basis, with attention given to academic record, work-related experiences, and the value of the internship to the students.

How to apply:

Republicans interested may apply online at www.senaterepublicans.in.gov/internship or contact **Kathleen Hursh** at 317-232-9519.

Democrats interested may apply online at www.senatedemocrats.in.gov/internship or contact **Jason Tomcsi** at 317-232-9496.

Deadline to apply is October 15.

Along with an application, candidates must submit a transcript, essay, writing sample and references.

Submitted applications will be reviewed, and those applicants chosen for interviews will meet with Senate staff no later than October 28. Internships will be announced by early November.



How can I remain a full-time student while participating in the internship program?

- On average, interns receive between 6 and 12 credits for working at least 35 hours a week in the Senate.
- A 3 credit-hour state government course, which takes place at the Statehouse throughout session, is available to all interns.

• Interns often arrange a correspondence or an independent course with a professor from their university.

• Classes may be available at an Indianapolis college or university.

College credit varies from school to school. Contact the Intern Director for guidance about specific schools or speak directly with your advisor.

How do I find housing in Indianapolis?

There are several downtown apartment complexes that offer short-term leases. Because the General Assembly hires at least 70 interns between all four caucuses, interns generally find roommates with whom to share housing expenses for the duration of session. Expenses do not need to exceed the cost of living on most Indiana campuses.

INDIANA SENATE INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

Place:	Indiana State Senate Statehouse, Indianapolis
Time:	Monday – Friday 8:30 a.m. – 4:45 p.m.
Stipend:	\$300 per week
Credit Hours:	Determined by university
Eligibility:	Juniors, seniors, graduate students or recent graduates who are residents of Indiana or are attending an Indiana college or university.

What is the Senate Internship Program?

This program represents a continuing attempt on the part of the Indiana Senate to involve young people in the work of the state legislature. All students at Indiana colleges and universities and Indiana students attending college outside the state are invited to participate in the program. A \$300 weekly stipend is offered to assist with living expenses. Days are often longer than eight hours.

Who should apply?

Any college junior, senior, graduate student or recent graduate in good standing is eligible to apply.

No specific major is required, but a successful candidate must enthusiastically want to learn about government and politics in the real world. Other necessary skills include:

- Excellent writing skills
- Exceptional interpersonal skills
- Basic computer skills
- Effective time management
- Professional attitude

What scholarship opportunities are available?

Verizon Communications provides each caucus the opportunity to award a \$3,000 cash scholarship to an intern of their choice.

Additionally, both caucuses award a \$1,000 scholarship from the Rick Gudal Public Service Scholarship Fund. Rick Gudal worked for the Indiana Senate Democratic Caucus for 18 years before tragically passing away on January 17, 2005. The scholarship celebrates Rick's public service legacy and love of education.



Winners have five years to use the awards, after which the money will be donated to their alma mater in their name. Selection is based on input from legislators, staff and peers.
